Teaching Strategy for "More Than a Mentor"

Length of lesson: 1-2 days

Lesson Introduction

 Attention getter: Show a picture of Superman or Superwoman or both on your overhead projector or Smartboard

Discussion questions:

- As a child, who was your superhero that wore a cape?
- What might be another term for superhero? (*Answer: mentor*)
- What does the term mentor mean to you?

<u>Definitions of mentor</u>

- 1. an experienced and trusted adviser
- 2. trusted counselor or guide
- 3. tutor, coach
- 4. an experienced person who advises and helps somebody with less experience over a period of time
- 5. a person who shares their knowledge, skills, and/or their experience, to help another person, or group of people to progress (Traditionally a mentor would guide a mentee in a one-to-one mentoring relationship.)

Option: Give students 30 seconds to use their phones to look up the definition of mentor and award points for the first 3 students (to be used on the next class test), then discuss their definition finds.

Option: Have a large poster board at the front of the room or use the smart board; divide students into groups, and ask students to look up the definition of mentor and condense it to 1 to 3 words, then use color markers to write those definitions on the board of choice.

Assignment

Assign students to read "More Than a Mentor". After reading, students should then write a one-page comparison report. Students should define three mentors in their life and discuss three traits of those mentors.

Following the writing assignment, have a class discussion of the traits of the mentors of the students. Create a list on a posterboard or butcher paper on a bulletin board if you want students to continue to see these terms or on the Smartboard.

Conclusion

How important are mentors in our life?

Do you think that you are a mentor for anyone?
