C-Section Anatomy

1st Incision: Skin—usually cut horizontally, 4-6 inches long

2nd Incision: Fat—cut horizontally
3rd Incision: Fascia—cut horizontally

4th Incision: AB Muscles—do not cut. Separated vertically and

pulled open

5th Incision: Peritoneum—cut vertically **Bladder**—Do not cut! Moved toward feet

6th Incision: Uterus—usually cut horizontally, but might be cut vertically

in an emergency

7th Incision: Amniotic Sac—cut or

pulled open
